Dear Parent.

Greetings as we complete the first month of the 2014-2015 school year! We are off to a great start and I am confident that this year will be another productive one for all. As you may know, we most recently received our School Report Card from the Department of Public Instruction for the 2013-2014 school year and I am proud to report that growth scores are up and achievement gaps are closing. It is clear that our teachers are using student data to guide their instruction in very specific ways.

During the first few weeks of the new school year, teachers have been spending time reviewing and practicing routines and procedures with their students. Research shows that when children are confident with routines and procedures that they will be better prepared to make appropriate choices in all settings. To this end, Mr. Nehls held a "Playground Rodeo" to familiarize our children with routines and procedures on our playground as well. Mr. Nehls has also acquainted the children with our new track during these beautiful fall days.

Hopefully, home routines to support our busy days at school are also in place. Children rely upon and need structure as these important transitions occur. Eight to ten hours of sleep is still the "norm" and a nutritious breakfast feeds our brains. If you find that your child does not have enough time in the morning for breakfast at home, please know that breakfast is served at school through your family lunch account.

Throughout the month of September our teachers have been meeting in collaborative teams during Late Start time and grade level team meetings to review last year's student data and analyze this year's student data. Information of this type is then used to make instructional decisions and to determine growth goals for each student. Know that ongoing data collection, the monitoring of student progress and the implementation of strategic interventions are all part of our Response to Intervention (RtI) process that keeps us focused toward our year end student achievement goals.

In addition to our daily instruction, all of first and second grade students have taken two formal assessments. The *Phonological Awareness and Literacy Screening (PALS)* is the state-provided screening tool. *PALS* measures the young child's knowledge of letter sounds, spelling, concept of word, word recognition in isolation, and oral passage reading. The major purpose of *PALS* is to identify those students who are below grade-level expectations in these areas and may be in need of additional reading instruction. The PALS assessment will be administered three times during the year to best monitor student progress. Our 4PS and kindergarten students will be assessed with *PALS* for the first time mid October.

Students in kindergarten, first and second grade have also taken the STAR assessment. STAR assessments measure specific skills as well as overall early literacy, reading, and math ability. These assessments compare students' achievement to that of students across the nation, estimate mastery of our state standards and report growth over time. STAR assessments will be used across all grade levels district wide.

Speaking of district-wide, I encourage you to check out the RASD website for calendar events and important information. For now please mark your calendars for the evening of October 9<sup>th</sup>. This will be an opportunity for you to "Meet Our Specialists" in conjunctions with Parent Teacher Conferences. We look forward to seeing you then!

## **Immunization Clinic**

Wednesday, October 1st, 2014, the Fond du Lac County Health Dept. will be holding an immunization clinic at Ripon High School from 3-5 pm.

Children who are entering 6<sup>th</sup> grade will need a booster dose of Tdap (pertussis containing vaccine). This vaccine is available free of charge, regardless of insurance status at the above clinic.

The immunization clinic is able to accommodate English and Spanish speaking clients.

Additional vaccines will also be available at the clinic, but are limited to individuals:

- Who have no insurance
- Children who are on Medical Assistance (Forward card/ BadgerCare).
- Whose insurance does not cover selected vaccines
- Who are American Indian and Alaska native whose only source of health care is provided by an Indian Health Service.

Vaccines can also be provided at the Fond du Lac Cty, Health Department during regularly scheduled office hours 8 to 4 pm Monday – Friday, or during immunization clinics held every 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday from 3-5 pm. ## **Attendance**

Written approval from the child's parent or guardian is required in order for a child to be excused from school attendance. The written excuse should specify the reason for the absence and state the time period for which it is effective.

#### **Excused absence**

- illness
- doctor/dentist appointment that can be scheduled at no other time
- emergency (determined by Principal)

#### Unexcused absences

- errands
- shopping
- haircuts
- caring for younger or sick siblings
- out of town trips, vacations or family time that has not been prearranged

#### Excused tardy—marked after 8:15 am

- medical appointments that fall at the beginning of the morning or afternoon session
- transportation delays due to hazardous weather

#### Unexcused tardy—marked after 8:15 am

- arriving late because adequate time was not allowed
- oversleeping
- parent/guardian work schedules
- · student supervision of siblings

#### Prearranged absence

Although the school discourages absence from school during regularly scheduled school days, a parent/guardian may excuse a child, in writing for not more than 10 days in a school year. **This request must be made a minimum of one day in advance of the child's absence.** The following questions will be considered prior to approval of a prearranged absence:

- I. Is the student in good academic standing?
- 2. Is the student's attendance record good?
- 3. Has the student previously completed homework and make-up assignments responsibly on time?

# WELCOME TO BARLOW PARK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND JOURNEY CHARTER SCHOOL!

Please review the following informational items as we begin our new school year:

- Our first bell rings at 8:00 am and our second bell rings at 8:05 am signaling the start of our instructional day.
- Outside supervision for our students begins at 7:45 am. Students who arrive between 7:45-8:00 am will be supervised outside by our playground supervisors as our teachers are planning for the school day between 7:30-8:00 am.
- Students can be dropped off at the front of our school between 7:45 8:00 am. If you are not able or do not choose to park your vehicle and walk your child to the sidewalk, children can exit your vehicle along the yellow curb on the sidewalk. Please be patient as students are dropped off and do not park along the yellow curb.
- The front door of our main entrance will remain locked during school hours. To enter our building, you will need to ring the bell and a member of our staff will "buzz" you in.
- Students can also be dropped off at the turn-around in the park behind our school at 7:45 am. Parents are reminded that our west side parking lot is reserved for buses and staff parking only. For the safety of our children, private vehicles are not allowed in this parking lot.
- Our instructional day ends at 3:13 p.m. Please wait for your child in the parent waiting area outside of the office or in the media center. This practice will avoid end of the day distractions as teachers are giving final directions at the end of the day and more importantly, keep our school as safe as possible.
- \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Outside supervision for our students at the end of the day will be provided until 3:30 pm. Children who do not ride the bus can to be picked up at the front of our school. Students must 💥 be escorted from the sidewalk to vehicles due to the amount of traffic at this time. With this in mind, parents are asked to park vehicles in the angle parking spaces provided and walk to meet their child on-site. Children can also be picked up at the turn around in the park behind our \*\* school. Supervision on the back playground is also provided for this purpose but it would be  $\divideontimes$ helpful for students to leave our playground area as soon as they are dismissed. Feel free to come back to play after our students have departed.
  - Please note that cell phones are not to be used in our school during the instructional day due to the unnecessary distractions they can cause to our students and staff. Please turn all cell phones off before entering the building.


# **Conscious Discipline at Barlow Park School**

Conscious Discipline® forms the basis of the school-wide Social Skills Program at Barlow Park School. Over the past several years staff members at Barlow Park have spent many hours learning and practicing the concepts of Conscious Discipline. Conscious Discipline is an evidence-based, social-emotional curriculum that facilitates a sense of community wherein positive behaviors and attitudes are taught and fostered in students, staff, and parents. These approaches are based on current brain research, child development information, and developmentally appropriate practices. Conscious Discipline was developed by Dr. Becky Bailey, PhD., and was recognized as a national model by the Character Education Partnership in 2005.

In keeping with Conscious Discipline's focus on building caring, cooperative, and respectful relationships as a foundation for achieving school success, we have organized our school's Social Skills Program around the theme of "We Are a School Family." Our goal is to create problem-solvers who are able to successfully manage the important life tasks of learning, displaying self-control, forming relationships, communicating effectively, and getting along with others. Seven basic skills of discipline related to social and emotional competence form the core of our monthly instructional program. These are:

Choices Composure
Encouragement Assertiveness
Consequences Empathy
Positive Intent

Through direct instruction and guided practice in everyday situations, students will have the opportunity to learn and practice skills of interaction that promote respect and develop the inner self-discipline necessary for effective learning.



# **Responsive Classroom Approach**

The teachers at Journey Charter School and many staff members from Barlow Park Elementary School use the Responsive Classroom Approach into their daily teaching practices. This approach uses the following Guiding Principles to ensure best teaching practices:

- The social curriculum is as important as the academic curriculum.
- How children learn is as important as what they learn: Process and content go hand in hand.
- The greatest cognitive growth occurs through social interaction.
- To be successful academically and socially, children need to learn and practice specific social skills. Five particularly important skills are cooperation, assertion, responsibility, empathy, and self-control (often referred to in the Responsive Classroom approach with the acronym CARES).
- Knowing the children we teach-individually, culturally, and developmentally-is as important as knowing the content we teach.
- Knowing the families of the children we teach is as important as knowing the children we teach.
- How we, the adults at school, work together is as important as our individual competence: Lasting change begins with the adult community.

As the school year begins, students will experience many events & activities to stimulate musical growth. During the month of September, we focus on the steady beat through singing, playing, listening, moving, creating, reading, & writing. The first & second graders then learn new rhythm patterns to play. Here is a quick summary of outcomes worked on:

Kindergarten children are learning basic music concepts that include the steady beat, and high & low sounds. We are developing a song repertoire from which performance activities & games can be derived. Singing games always have a positive influence on specific social skills while developing steady beat skills. Ask your child to sing & do the motions with "Johnny Works with One Hammer," for example.

First graders are playing the steady beat, using body percussion & instruments while singing. They are beginning to read & perform rhythm patterns – long sounds (ta) & 2 short sounds together (ti-ti). First graders are also demonstrating ostinatos (repeated patterns). Ask your child to do "Hop Old Squirrel" with words & patclapping.

Second graders are reviewing rhythm patterns that use "ta, ti-ti, & ta rest." We have been creating & playing ostinatos which reinforce these patterns. Ask your child to perform the "apple" ostinato pattern & motions they created in cooperative teams....they were awesome! It is so rewarding to see the retention & growth as they apply their music skills!

WOW! What a great start to the beginning of a new school year. Each class has started the year off with creating a self portrait that will be saved until the time they reach 5th grade. At the end of 5th grade students will be able to look back at all the self portraits they have done and they will notice how much their drawing skills have improved over the years.

We will be doing something new this year for our newsletters. We are going to capitalize all our vocabulary words and medium used. Your child will have been taught these words as we go through the projects. Ask your child what the words mean and what kind of medium they used to create their projects.

In Kindergarten we have finished our first project. We used WATERCOLORS to make a BACKGROUND. We used black ink to blow our trees. We then used TEMPERA paint to make our leaves. We used a foam brush and dipped it into paint. Then we made dots on the trees for our leaves.

In first grade we have finished our first project. We talked about PRINTMAKING and FOUND OBJECTS. Each student used METALLIC PAINT to make a print with leaves. They used three papers to create a TRIPTYCH. We cut out our leaves and glued them onto a long piece of construction paper. To finish the project we used the metallic paint and added dots.

In second grade we read the book "Elmer." We talked about how being different is a good thing. We looked at the SHAPES of an elephant. We used those shapes to draw the OUTLINE. We used a sharpie marker to trace all lines. We used TISSUE PAPER and glue to fill in the elephant. When all of the glue dried we used the sharpie marker to draw PATTERNS on the elephant so that everyone was different. We then glued our elephants onto construction paper.

Many students had the opportunity to continue developing their love for books over the summer with the Summer Reading Program. # "We are a School Family" Barlow Park/Journey Social Skills Program

October: Composure "We use self-control."



The discipline skill of "composure" will be the focus of the Social Skills Program during the month of October. Composure can be defined as self-control in action. Healthy, secure relationships require that we control our own upset. This is true of both adults and children. The ability to be aware of and manage one's emotions has been called "emotional intelligence." How individuals develop with respect to emotional intelligence has been found to be a greater predictor of future academic, career, and social success than intellectual ability. It is essential that children be provided with regular opportunities to learn to acknowledge and name their feelings and be taught appropriate ways to express and manage those feelings. In particular, anger management is integral to social competence. Neither children nor adults can think clearly when they are angry and upset. The children's storybook, Shubert is a S.T.A.R., has been used to show students appropriate ways to calm themselves when they are upset. Modeling and role-playing has also helped students learn how to use words to express their feelings and solve problems in cooperative ways. Ask your child to show you how to be a "S.T.A R." at calming down!

Lessons in our Social Skills Program in the month of October included the following:

- I. We calm ourselves when we are upset.
  - a. S.T.A.R (Stop, Take a deep breath And Relax)
  - b. Pretzel
  - c. Balloon
  - d. Drain
- 2. We talk one at a time.
  - a. Raise your hand to have a turn.
  - b. Talk loudly enough for others to hear.
  - c. Stick to the point—others are waiting for a turn.
  - d. If you need to interrupt a conversation:
    - ♥Say "Excuse me."
    - ♥Use "Body Basics" when talking.
- 3. We accept "No" from a person in authority.
  - a. Use "Body Basics".
  - b. Say "OK".
  - c. Stay Calm.
  - d. Do as you are asked.
- 4. We can share our feeling appropriately.
  - a. Notice how bodies and actions show feelings.
  - b. Know that it is OK to be mad, but not OK to be hurtful.
  - c. Think about how to calm yourself without being hurtful.
    - ♥S.T.A.R, Pretzel, Balloon, Drain.
    - ♥Go to a safe place to calm down.
    - Ask for a time to share feelings with a person in authority.
  - d. If feelings have been hurt by another, use words to tell that person.

## Two referendum questions to appear on the ballot:

## Question 1

Question 1: requests permission to borrow funds not to exceed \$29.1 million for paying the cost of constructing additions to, renovating and remodeling the high school to create a combined middle school and high school on one campus; demolishing the current middle school to convert the space into a parking lot and tennis courts; undertaking safety, security and other improvements at the elementary schools; and acquiring furnishings, fixtures and equipment.

## Question 2

Question 2: requests the continuation of the existing \$500,000 operational referendum for the 2015-2016 school year through 2020-2021 for non-recurring purposes consisting of updating curriculum, updating technology, performing maintenance and replacing vehicles.

Renovations help to extend the building's life, but the Middle School has been in use for 75 years, 35 years longer than the average expectancy.



In recent years, the District has been focused on developing educational initiatives to better prepare our students for careers, college and life after high school. The District has made a commitment to provide students and staff with the training, support, and resources needed for success.

It's now time to address our outdated school facilities by providing safe, affordable, accessible, and equitable schools for all students and staff. The District has been working with the community for more than a year to define a long-term Facilities Master Plan to cost-effectively repair and revitalize our aging facilities.

Our schools have become inefficient and outdated. Furthermore, the Middle School has exceeded its useful life. The proposed plan would demolish the existing school and create a combined Middle School and High School facility. With renovations and additions, the existing High School building can continue to be used. This project maintains the pool, improves the auditorium and adds a gym, cafeteria, and classroom space to accommodate all students in grades 6-12. The combined facility can still accommodate an increase in enrollment, while maximizing operating efficiency by consolidating from two schools into one school. This plan provides a long-term solution for Ripon Area School District.




